

About IVAT

Our History

In 2022, together with our team and community, we celebrated our 37th year as an Institute. The Family Violence and Sexual Assault Institute (FVSAI), as we were originally known, was founded in 1984 by Robert Geffner, PhD, ABN, ABPP. In 1991, the Institute became a registered non-profit 501(c)3 organization to deal with family violence and sexual assault issues. It gradually expanded its scope to include child, teen, and elder maltreatment. In 1999, the Institute relocated to San Diego and, in 2006, continued its work under the name IVAT-the Institute on Violence, Abuse and Trauma.

OUR MISSION

To promote violence-free living by improving the quality of life for individuals on local, national and international levels by sharing and disseminating vital information, improving cross-discipline collaborations, conducting research and trainings, and providing direct professional services, program evaluation, and consulting.

OUR WORK

Hawai`i International Summit

The 19th Hawai`i International Summit on Preventing, Assessing & Treating Trauma Across the Lifespan focused on providing Trauma-Informed Care from a Cultural Perspective. This year, the Summit was held in person at the Hawai`i Convention Center in Honolulu, Hawai`i from March 28 - April 1st, 2022.

The Summit brought together the latest research on prevention, assessment, and intervention techniques concerning various aspects of trauma and maltreatment across the lifespan, as well as long term effects if left untreated. Plenary and breakout sessions discussed various types of child, adolescent, adult and elder trauma, the dynamics of maltreatment and trauma at home or in the community, and the psychological, behavioral, and neurodevelopmental effects. Nationally and internationally recognized presenters and local practitioners assembled to discuss the latest research, assessment methods, interventions, and prevention strategies for those who have been traumatized, abused, and/or victimized.

27th International Summit on Violence, Abuse & Trauma Across the Lifespan

The theme of the **27**th **San Diego International Summit on Violence, Abuse, and Trauma Across the Lifespan** was **Amplifying Voices for Recovery, Resilience, Reconciliation, and Reformation**. The Summit was held August 28th- August 31st, 2022 and included presentations and symposia by researchers, practitioners, advocates, policymakers, and consumers/survivors concerning adult survivors of abuse and trauma, child maltreatment/Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), adolescent trauma, historical trauma, systemic trauma and marginalized populations, intimate partner violence for both victims/survivors and offenders, labor and sex trafficking, legal and criminal justice issues, primary prevention and early intervention, sexual victimization, trauma among first responders, military personnel, veterans and their families, and trauma in general. We were thrilled to be back together again in person at the Hyatt Regency La Jolla.

855 people were involved in one or more activities throughout the week including the National Partnership to End Interpersonal Violence Across the Lifespan (NPEIV) annual Think Tank which drew 40 participants. 270 Summit attendees were from California and 143 people represented the San Diego County area. From across the country, 44 states were represented. We had international representation from 11 countries and US Territories (Canada, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Israel, New Zealand, Philippines, Republic of (South) Korea, Taiwan, Scotland, Mexico, Philippines, Great Britain, and the United States) and 39 international attendees. Summit attendees included Social Workers, Psychologists, Marriage and Family Therapists, Advocates, Attorneys, Judges, Law Enforcement Professionals, U.S Military members, Probation and Parole Officers, Clergy, Nurses, Physicians, Policy Makers, Administrators, Students, former victims/survivors, parents, and others.

Training

In 2022, IVAT's training department continued to expand its online offerings via our On-Demand training library through CE21. IVAT was also able to start providing in-person contracted trainings (following all COVID-19 safety measures and protocols) with hopes to be able to offer live in-person trainings again in 2023.

3,129 people were trained in 2022 between IVAT hosted events and co-sponsored trainings. Along with holding webinars available to the public, IVAT held trainings in conjunction with several local, government, and international organizations. CEO, Sandi Capuano Morrison, MA, and Nancy O'Malley, JD, in partnership with the Victim Witness Kokua Services in Hawai'i, provided a two-day training for Victim Advocates and Counselors, training more than 30 professionals on working with victims of crime. President, Robert Geffner, PhD, ABN, ABPP, trained 150 professionals within Florida's justice system on the neurological development of children who have been abused and countering myths in court cases. IVAT partnered with VEBA, Children's Law Project of Hawai'i, Arizona Higher Education, the United States Marine Corps, and the University of California, Los Angeles for additional training.



Hawai'i State Victim Assistance Academy

In a joint effort with Hawai`i Pacific University, and the Hawai`i Attorney General's office, IVAT provided 40 hours of online/virtual training to Victim Advocates and Counselors on the Hawaiian Islands. The training included topics such as financial crimes, elder abuse, overview of different justice systems, neurobiology of trauma, case management, specialty populations, stalking, human trafficking, historical trauma, and much more. The majority of the speakers who presented were local to Hawai`i and included professionals and survivors within the field of victim witness advocates and direct service providers to victims of crime.

Continuing Education & Certifications

IVAT is approved by the American Psychological Association to sponsor continuing education for psychologists (IVAT maintains responsibility for this continuing education program and its content). The California Board of Behavioral Sciences (BBS) now accepts the APA continuing education credit for license renewal for LCSWs, LMFTs, LPCCs, and LEPs. Professional Clinical & Forensic Services

IVAT continues to serve the community by providing direct services through our Professional Clinical and Forensic Services (PCFS) department. Clinically, the PCFS team, provides trauma focused therapeutic services to a wide range of child, adolescent, and adult clients. We serve all clients on a sliding scale fee structure dependent on income. IVAT clinicians also support the community through partnerships with local organizations where we provide trauma-informed training to staff and clinical services to specific clients in need. Our 2022 partners included: the YWCA of San Diego County, the Bilateral Safety Corridor Coalition, Access, Inc., The National Conflict Resolution Center, and VEBA Resource Center.

In the forensic arena, IVAT clinicians provided trauma-informed psychological and neuropsychological evaluations in the adult criminal, juvenile, civil, and family court systems. Our team consults regularly with legal professionals and provides expert witness testimony on a wide range of topic areas including child maltreatment, intimate partner violence, sexual violence and the impact of trauma. All of our forensic work is done on a sliding scale to help serve as many individuals and families as possible.

Clinical & Forensic Training Program

Over the past year, PCFS has expanded the training program to include more clinicians and worked with several masters, doctorate, and post-doctorate level students as part of its clinical and forensic training program. Partnerships with Alliant International University and The Chicago School of Professional Psychology provided doctoral students for this premier training program. IVAT also accepted students from master's degree programs in Forensics and in Clinical Counseling, such as Southern New Hampshire University, and Maastricht University in the Netherlands.

Students in the program gain experience in three main areas, designed to sharpen their clinical skills, develop a solid forensic foundation, and become proficient in relevant psychological topics to train other professionals. In the clinical portion of their training in 2022, associates served over 100 therapy clients, both in an outpatient private practice setting in the office as well as organizations in the community. Forensically, students were exposed to criminal cases locally and nationally and civil cases including personal injury and family law matters (e.g. custody).

Ho`omaluhia

A Center of Excellence where East meets West, where indigenous voices are valued and diversity is honored, Ho`omaluhia is the Hawai`i Pacific branch of IVAT.

In 2022, the Ho`omaluhia Advisory Council, which consists of 36 representatives from various state agencies in Hawai`i and local nonprofit agencies, held quarterly meetings to review and assess the most effective ways to meet the needs of those on the islands with respect to integration of services and training. Representatives from the Department of Health, Department of Human Services, Honolulu Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, Institute for Human Services, and Lili`uokalani Trust among others continue to work with IVAT related to issues of homelessness and evaluation of mental health services for people with trauma histories. Additional priority areas consisted of suicide prevention training, social-emotional learning, anti-bullying education, racial equity, trauma-informed care, and sexual violence prevention. Ho`omaluhia also began hosting webinar trainings for our local and global communities.

Program Evaluation

WOMEN'S COURT

Ho`omaluhia proposed to evaluate the effectiveness of the new Hawai`i's Women's Court by developing a screening battery to assess the women in the areas of trauma, psychological functioning, substance misuse, attitudes, and behaviors.

KAHAUIKI VILLAGE

Kahauiki Village (KV) is a unique project from the Institute for Human Services (IHS), which hopes to build family resilience by growing a neighborhood culture that encourages more positive community experiences. Ho`omaluhia partnered with IHS to design and implement a program evaluation for KV where families and children share feedback to continuously improve client services and ensure they meet the needs of the community members.

Dr. Robert Geffner, IVAT, and Dr. Lori Daniels, Hawai`i Pacific University (HPU), oversee program evaluation efforts.



Stop the Silence®

Stop the Silence® continues its diligent efforts for over two decades to prevent, treat, and mitigate child sexual abuse (CSA) and now, other adverse childhood experiences (ACEs). During 2022, we continued our focus on advocacy (e.g., through the arts), training (e.g., of nannies and educators), and education (e.g., of various types of service providers. We are helping change the world!

Over 2022, Stop the Silences' efforts focused largely on the following three areas:

Development of an accredited online education program toward a Certificate and Master's in Child Trauma and Protection. This program is being conducted in partnership between Stop the Silence and the University of Applied Research and Development (UARD) based in the UK with leadership also in New Zealand. This year, we completed the presentations for the Certificate-level post-graduate, accredited online education program that can be done inexpensively and at students' own pace. The first class will start in April 2023 during Child Abuse Awareness Month in the U.S. This class will be recruited from a U.S. cohort, but the program will ultimately be open to a world population at a relevant cost per population. The Master's program is expected to be available in 2024.

The book, Stop the Silence – Thriving After Child Sexual Abuse, completed in 2022, will be published through Brave Healer Productions on Amazon on or around March 7, 2023. It will be available online and in hard copy, with shipping, in April, ready for Child Abuse Awareness month. Written by a group of international survivors of CSA who became therapists, clinicians, and/or other types of healers and helpers, the book includes each author's story and a practice section that provides best practices, helpful advice, and suggestions. The authors come from Latin America, North America, Cyprus, Egypt, Zambia, Samoa, New Zealand, and Guam, and includes stories about peoples from other places in the world.

The book cover presents a painting of a dragonfly by Sinclair Stratton. The dragonfly symbolizes change, transformation, adaptability, and self-realization. The back cover and inside provide reviews from Sandi Capuano Morrison, CEO, IVAT; Angela Rose, Founder and Executive Director, Promoting Awareness | Victim Empowerment (PAVE); Victor Vieth, Chief Program Officer for Education & Research, Zero Abuse Project; Bull Murray, Founder, Director, National Association of Adult Survivors of Child Abuse (NAASCA); and others.

The Out of the Shadows exhibit by photographer Jan Goff LaFontaine, who did survivors' portraits at the Race to Stop the Silence (2004-2013), is now part of the important materials owned by Stop the Silence-IVAT. In addition to displaying the exhibit at the IVAT Summits, we have been gearing up for marketing to reach out to and partner with other groups (e.g., universities, museums, non-profit groups) so that they too can use these exquisite photos for advocacy and educational purposes.

Research

As part of our overall mission, IVAT maintains several research databases that are used to add to the publication and dissemination of literature in a number of topic areas. IVAT has contributed extensive research in the field of violence and trauma and continues to do so primarily through the utilization of active archival data of cases through the forensic work that Dr. Robert Geffner, and the Professional Clinical & Forensic Service (PCFS) team have conducted over several decades. The databases are also comprised of data collected from other national practitioners and agencies who have allowed us to store and use their data for research purposes.

Dr. Geffner has supervised doctorate students and worked with them to identify research topics and questions to be answered using the databases housed at IVAT. These dissertations are frequently submitted to academic, peer- reviewed journals and contribute to the literature of various disciplines. Research Assistants had the opportunity to code case files and data collected from program evaluations, assist with research projects, cofacilitate focus groups, conduct assessments, and other needs related to research and program evaluation. The current goal of these databases is to provide researchers of IVAT and research students from partnered doctoral programs access to archival data that can be used for further studies.

Program Evaluation – Bilateral Safety Corridor Coalition (BSCC)

IVAT contracted with the Bilateral Safety Corridor Coalition (BSCC) to provide trauma-focused clinical mental health services, psychological and forensic evaluations, and to implement methods for program evaluation for a three-year period, from January 2020 - December 2022. The program evaluation was designed to gain an understanding of the program's operations and activities in relation to client dynamics, including challenges in goal completion. Both organizations worked to appropriately adapt to overcome the unique challenges presented by the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, including the unexpected restrictions on face-to-face time with clients. Performance measures were identified for each objective addressing case management, service delivery and utilization, and client satisfaction.



Objective 1: Identify efficiency of Victim Service Delivery and Utilization

Objective 2: Analyze Victim/Survivor Satisfaction with Services Provided

Objective 3: Report findings and recommendations of trauma-informed services

Strengthening a Victims Services Model

IVAT's program evaluation included a comprehensive intake for tracking demographics and victimology data, progress in treatment and programming, and specific assessment tools to strengthen the programming at BSCC. Trauma assessments were piloted to identify severity of trauma symptoms among BSCC's clients to assist with evaluating services, client progress and overall wellbeing. The data collected will serve to guide future evaluation in better understanding the dynamics of different forms of human trafficking and the experiences of those working closely with individuals who have experienced human trafficking. In the final report, IVAT outlined successes, challenges and limitations, a summary of barriers, recommended trainings, overall recommendations and provided lessons learned to strengthen BSCC's Comprehensive Victims Services Model for Victims of Sex and Labor Trafficking in San Diego, California.

Provided activities specific to project implementation and program evaluation:

- Trainings and consultations provided to BSCC staff enhanced trauma-informed practices and identified strengths and interventions within the current group
- Intake procedures were modified utilizing up-to-date research and designed to be more inclusive and comprehensive through a trauma-informed lens
- Measures were piloted and chosen to assess program and therapeutic outcomes
- Focus groups and interviews were conducted with BSCC staff and executives, core leadership team, and adjunct services providers
- Qualitative and quantitative data were coded, reviewed, and synthesized
- A complete program evaluation report was provided

Trauma-Focused Therapeutic Services

A key part of the evaluation included IVAT working with BSCC under an Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) grant to provide clinical and forensic services. IVAT worked to strengthen BSCC's trauma-informed approach to client-centered work by providing trainings to BSCC case managers. IVAT received positive feedback from BSCC staff as to the utility of the training. As state health orders eased, IVAT clinicians began to meet inperson for trauma-focused therapeutic services for BSCC clients by request. Therapists reported positive outcomes from clients served, and this was reiterated in qualitative data collected from BSCC staff, leadership, and adjunct service partners. Direct services are crucial to improved program efficiency and service delivery addressing trauma and resilience among those who have experienced human trafficking.





The National Partnership to End Interpersonal Violence Across The Lifespan

IVAT serves as the fiscal and logistical agent for the *National Partnership to End Interpersonal Violence Across the Lifespan (NPEIV)*, a partnership of people, organizations, agencies, and coalitions working together on a national, multi-disciplinary, cross-cultural scale to end interpersonal violence. Their mission is to advance diversity, inclusion, equity, and quality in research, practice, policy, and advocacy to end interpersonal violence. NPEIV believes it is a basic human right to be safe at home, safe at school, safe in the community, and safe when interacting with the institutions of our society.

NPEIV Think Tank 2022 "Building Safe Communities: Restorative Justice as a Path Towards Connection and Healing"

NPEIV holds an annual Think Tank where new and returning members come together to discuss goal setting, objectives, and directives to continue building a blueprint for change. The Think Tank provides an excellent opportunity for networking with professionals from multiple disciplines who are dedicated to finding solutions to some of the most complex issues we face in addressing our mission to end interpersonal violence across the lifespan. This year's Think Tank was opened with an introduction to NPEIV, and a message from NPEIV President, Dr. Shelly Wagers. Dr. Alissa Ackerman provided the keynote presentation on "Building Safe Communities: Restorative Justice as a Path Towards Connection and Healing" and discussed how making Restorative Justice accessible and inclusive to all communities and people could begin to restore the world from sexual harm. Restorative Justice was presented as a human-centered approach to repairing and preventing harm.



Members in attendance found the keynote to be powerful and education, yet intimate and personal. They noted Dr. Ackerman delivered a wonderfully intimate and brave personal story. They felt encouraged to look beyond the issues and look for positive and restorative possibilities. The speaker put complex topics together in an easy-to-follow, understandable way and demonstrated how it could be applied, while keeping the presentation engaging for all. The attendees felt that they had clear next steps after the keynote.

Action Team 1

Public Policy & Engagement focuses on the coordination of educational efforts regarding the impact of public policy on individuals and communities, maximizing public policy efforts through public engagement, and developing evidence- based policy perspectives that target the reduction and elimination of interpersonal violence and abuse across the lifespan.

Action Team 3

Practice links research with policy and best practices to implement traumainformed care, reducing the impact of previous trauma and breaking the cycle that perpetuates violence across the lifespan.

Action Team 5

Global Peace collaborates with allies internationally engaged in parallel efforts to address violence, focusing on initiatives that provide analysis, education, and resources to those working for peace.

Training & Mentoring is dedicated to using educational initiatives to end violence and addresses training and mentoring needs in various professions, including the development of curriculum and other types of educational initiatives.

Action Team 4

Research & Dissemination encourages useful research to further our understanding of the etiology, prevention, and treatment of interpersonal violence, and aims to reduce the effects of interpersonal violence.

In 2022-2023, NPEIV has worked on the three following projects:

Training Grant: Community – Based Violence Intervention & Prevention Program

This project is in collaboration with Northwestern University, IVAT, and the Association of Maternal & Child Health Programs, led by long-term NPEIV member Dr. Heather Risser. The primary goal of this project is to provide training and technical assistance to grantees in the state of Illinois. These trainings will encourage engagement from community stakeholders to promote equity in access to mental health services; provide support for translating best practices into community-based services; provide support to promote the effective and equitable implementation of prevention services; provide training in child abuse prevention and intervention; and support trauma-informed training in schools.

Trauma- Informed Financial Services

This project in collaboration with Kairos DCC, IVAT, and 360 Factors is led by Action Team 3 co-chair, Connie Davis. The primary goal of this project is to offer interpersonal violence expertise and persona-based use cases. Within this project, NPEIV will work to promote awareness of person clusters pertaining to trauma characteristics to inform and model financial services AI, chatbots, and financial service stakeholders; provide support for translating best practices into community-based financial services; provide support to promote meaningful and timely financial services to shorten the duration of violence exposure; provide training in economic and financial abuse familial characteristics; and support trauma-informed training for banks, credit unions and other financial service technology providers.

Violence Education Through Social Media

This project has three main goals: increase public awareness of the warning signs of violence across the lifespan; increase public and political awareness of effective strategies for ending violence and promoting positive development across the lifespan; and provide information for how to access help that is currently available in the state of Pennsylvania. The campaign includes educational webinars for the general public on common risk factors for different forms of interpersonal violence and effective treatment, prevention and public policy. Finally, there will be two free policy briefings for politicians: one that also covers the common risk factors for different forms of violence and the other that deals with effective interventions and public policy. These presentations will also encourage visits to the violence education pages of the website – www.npiev.org. This project has been led by Pearl Berman, NPEIV past president.

To make the prevention of interpersonal violence a national priority, we must prioritize the elimination of systemic oppression. We must do more than talk. We must act.

Community and Public Relations

During the second half of 2022, IVAT added a new Community and Public Relations Department, comprised of a Director and Community and Marketing Coordinator.
